There are two types of Membership:

1. Active Membership:
 - a. Those members who actively support the goals and objectives of the Coalition and participate fully in the projects and functions of the organization
 - b. Those members whose dues are current as shall be determined by the finance committee.

2. Associate Membership:
 - a. Required to pay dues
 - b. Not required to attend monthly meetings
 - c. Not eligible to serve as officers
 - d. Not eligible to vote

Membership Process

Prospective members are encouraged to attend a Membership Informational event prior to application.

Applicants must submit a complete application to the Membership Chair. Upon receipt, the Membership Committee will review applications and schedule interviews, if necessary for applicants.

Following the interview process, the membership committee will extend offers of membership to those applicants who most closely identify with the Chapter's goals and expectations for members. Membership dues in the amount of \$150 are due within 7 days of notification of acceptance, or prior to the induction ceremony, whichever comes first.

New members will be inducted and oriented to the Chapter as full members.

- The typical coalition woman has a college degree, and holds a professional position.
- She is actively involved in the political and social life of her community.
- The common age range is between 25-60.
- She can make a flexible time commitment to the organization and its activities.

- She has access to resources and influential people for the purpose of conducting chapter business.
- She believes in the mission and vision of the NC100BW - Omaha Metropolitan Chapter.
